Although / though / even though In spite of / despite

Study this example situation:





Last year Paul and Sarah had a holiday by the sea. It rained a lot, but they enjoyed it.

You can say:

Although it rained a lot, they enjoyed it.

(= It rained a lot, but they ...)

or

In spite of Despite the rain, they enjoyed it.

	After although we use a subject + verb: Although it rained a lot, we enjoyed our holiday. I didn't get the job although I had the necessary qualifications. Compare the meaning of although and because: We went out although it was raining heavily.
° D	 We didn't go out because it was raining heavily. After in spite of or despite, we use a noun, a pronoun (this/that/what etc.) or -ing: In spite of the rain, we enjoyed our holiday. I didn't get the job in spite of having the necessary qualifications. She wasn't well but in spite of this she continued working.

In spite of what I said yesterday, I still love you.

Despite is the same as **in spite of**. We say **in spite of**, but **despite** (without of):

O She wasn't well, but **despite this** she continued working. (not despite of this)

You can say in spite of the fact (that) ... and despite the fact (that) ...:

I didn't get the job in spite of the fact (that) despite the fact (that) l had the necessary qualifications.

Compare in spite of and because of:

- We went out in spite of the rain. (or ... despite the rain.)
- We didn't go out because of the rain.

Compare although and in spite of / despite:

Although the traffic was bad,
 In spite of the traffic,
 we arrived on time. (not In spite of the traffic was bad)

I couldn't sleep { although I was very tired. (not despite I was tired) despite being very tired.

Though is the same as although:

I didn't get the job though I had the necessary qualifications.

In spoken English we often use **though** at the end of a sentence:

- The house isn't so nice. I like the garden **though**. (= but I like the garden)
 - I see them every day. I've never spoken to them **though**. (= but I've never spoken to them)

Even though (but not 'even' alone) is a stronger form of **although**:

Even though I was really tired, I couldn't sleep. (not Even I was really tired ...)
